SERVICES to put children and parents on the right path for life are being brought together in the nation's largest programme to open children's centres.

Centres in Haslingden, Preston, Accrington and Skelmersdale won official children's centre accreditation last month alone and a total of 30 should be operating by the end of March.

While centre staff work with children, their parents gain experience and access to a range of courses and assistance in health and searching for work.

The £10m scheme's aim is to integrate education, health and family support to help parents support their children and set a good example for the future.

Centres are to unite services from the local authority, NHS, JobCentres and private and voluntary organisations.

"The welfare of children can't be seen in isolation from the well-being of their par-ents," said County Councillor Clive Grunshaw, cabinet member for children and young people.

"It is about providing the best start in life for children - and that means supporting their parents in things such as getting back to work and setting a good example to children

"The very first centres were opened in deprived areas but the less deprived areas are now being given centres which will be tailored to local need."

A total of 15 centres are now designated by the Department for Education and Skills as children's centres.

Parts of Lancashire benefiting from the programme include Burnley (four centres), Chorley (one centre), Hyndburn (three), Lancaster (two), Pendle (four), Preston (six), Ribble Valley (one), Rossendale (three), South Ribble (one), West Lancashire (three) and Wyre two).

Some centres have been built from scratch while others are extensions or adap-

tations to existing buildings such as schools or Sure Start initiatives.

As well as teachers, staff include health and social workers and training staff.

The county council's Family Support Service is also involved in support packages that include behaviour management, life skills, child protection and support for looked-after children and carers.

Councillor Grunshaw added: Partnership working is fundamental to the future provision of support services for children and families across Lancashire.

Cash help to study

STUDENTS and their parents are being offered help to guide them through huge changes to the student finance system - and being reminded of looming application

From this academic year, parents and students starting their course from 2006 need not worry about "upfront" tuition fees as such payments will be made by students themselves when they finish studying and start earning.

The 28 April deadline for non-means-tested financial support will soon be upon us while students from lower-earning families – those applying for means-tested grants - have until 30 June to make their applications.

Lancashire County Council's student service advisers are to visit most schools and colleges to

explain available cash support and how to get it. Impartial and free advice is also available in person or by writing to Lancashire Student Services, PO Box 61, County Hall, Preston PR1 8XJ, or by telephoning 01772 530430 or emailing lancashirestudentservices@ed.lancscc.gov.uk

Tina Walmsley, service development manager, said: "These are very big changes that will affect thousands of new students this year.

"As well as advice on grants and loans, we can also advise students on the availability of university bursaries and specially targeted support for disabled people and students who are also parents."

New students applying for non-means-tested financial support are those from families with annual incomes above £37,425. Those below that need to apply for means-tested grants.

Advisers are reminding people, where possible, to return applications a few days before the deadline to allow for postage and processing.

Application forms are to be posted to existing students, who will need to return their forms by 26 May, while new students can get forms from their school or college or via Lancashire Student Services.

Advisers can help on a range of issues, such as childcare, support whilst on placement and telling people how much they could potentially be entitled to.

Schools' deal shows we listen

THE future looks bright for parents and pupils after closure threats were lifted at their schools.

A schools review was ordered for Rossendale last year to tackle a growing empty-desk crisis.

The latest stages of a long and exhaustive consultation have concluded that all county schools in Bacup should be saved - and a new school built to house pupils from Cloughfold Primary School and Waterfoot Primary School.

County Councillor Alan Whittaker, cabinet member for schools, said: "Parents do need to know that their views are important as these reviews are held periodically across all areas of Lancashire.

"It is in no-one's interest to be teaching empty classes. This exercise shows that we are genuinely open to alternative views and that Lancashire is a county in which everyone has their say.

The latest set of proposals will go to a further public consultation with a final decision expected later this year.

ne Child Accident Prevention and Safety Scheme (CAPS) is a Preston Primary Care Trust initiative funded by the Lancashire Children's Fund

The main aim of CAPS is to reduce accidents and raise awareness in all areas of activity including the home, at school, and on the roads and railways.

CAPS aims to reach all ages of children throughout Preston and works in partnership with Sure Start, the Healthy Schools Programme and other agencies including the Lancashire Road Safety Group, Police and Fire and Rescue services.

The comprehensive Teaching Resource Pack has been written by professional teachers with input and support from various agencies. It has been trialled and evaluated in a number of schools and CAPS will be making it available to all primary schools in the Preston area in March. The pack includes :

- relevant statistics and key facts
- · lesson plans and resources for Key Stage One and Key Stage Two

- Information leaflet for parents/carers to consolidate the lessons and raise awareness of safety in the home
- · assembly presentation to involve the whole school
- list of resources, websites and local contacts to support safety within the classroom.

The pack is designed for flexible use and to support schools in choosing the approach that best meets their resources and the local needs. Suggestions on how this can be achieved at local level include:

- incorporating it into the curriculum through the PSHE programme and science
- · encouraging a safety themed day/week
- supporting the safety theme of the month as identified in the CAPS calendars already distributed





Your council tax - where it all goes

Your services: this picture is Chorley but it could be your town. Lancashire County Council provides 86% of local government provision in your area.



MENTION local government and most people think of just their Council Tax bill.

It seems to go up and up and people wonder what they get for their cash. This year's rise, for example, is 4.9 per cent – still above inflation as measured by the Retail Price Index.

Over the last five years, Lancashire County Council has agreed one of the lowest total Council Tax rises of all counties and a recent national survey judged the authority to be one of the top 11 "value for money" councils in the country.

Even so, bills are onerous and people deserve to know why they go up each year. It is down to a combination of factors:

- So-called "volume increases". Demand for social care, for instance, is led entirely by circumstance. People are living longer and care must be provided. Such increases also affect the cost of waste disposal.
- The Retail Price Index monitors goods in the shops, many of which are imported from low-wage countries. Most council spending is on items such as care services, highway maintenance, street lighting, and fuel in which inflation is far higher.
- Council Tax funds only part of the council's budget. Other money comes from central government. It means that any shortfall in central government funding falls disproportionately on the Council Tax payer.

Lancashire County Council tries hard to keep tax low and is on target to deliver £48mm of efficiency savings by 2008.

Rosebud First in Class

Rosebud has won the top prize of Fund of the Year 2006.

This prestigious award is from the North West Business Insider Magazine. This magazine is essential reading for all the top corporate finance and professionals in the North of England. Members were able to see the Lancashire Business Park at Leyland where LCDL is landlord to engineering and service businesses including Enterprise plc, the NHS and Business Link.

They also toured the SANAC centre in Preston's Avenham district where LCDL has helped the local community transform a disused church into a modern community facility offering meeting rooms, a gym and fitness area, Table tennis and basketball courts as well as services like Sure Start and a crèche.

LCDL's flagship investment fund, Rosebud, was not forgotten with a visit to Cheeky Monkeys in Bamber Bridge which is a flourishing business following help with a start up loan from the Rosebud fund.

Managing Director of LCDL, Steve Dean, said:

"As a department of the County Council our work comes under the spotlight of Overview and Scrutiny in just the same way as other council services.

"Of course only a fraction of the projects and businesses we help across Lancashire could be included, but I am sure the Committee members were given a real insight into the diverse and interesting work we do."

id you know that in 2005 your ambulances continued to provide emergency services and hospital transport services to the population of Lancashire, covering an area of 1,100 square miles? 468 operational A&E staff and 10 Intermediate Tier Personnel, using a range of fully equipped emergency vehicles including ambulances, rapid response cars and a motorbike, based at 24 stations, provide the core of the emergency service. A further 260 trained men and women provide patient transport services to those requiring assistance in getting to and from hospitals for non-emergency operations and aftercare. In a typical week around 3,500 calls are handled in the Emergency Control Room, requiring the 24 hour, 7 days a week involvement of trained call centre and support staff. In total 1064 people work together to provide ambulance services to the population of Lancashire. A major operation for a vital service.

The Lancashire Ambulance Service has an excellent reputation - as good as any in the country - of which it is rightly proud! It has achieved top 3 star rating in assessments for the past three years. This is down to the quality of all the people who work in the service, their vehicles and equipment and the systems and support that is given to front line services. IF YOU are intending to take waste from your household pet to one of our 23 sites, tell one of our "Here to Help" staff who will give you free brightly coloured bags to take away and use. Each time you bring the bags back they will be replaced free of charge.

This is because waste from the non-recyclable skips is hand sorted to pull out material that can be recycled. To make it easier for staff to identify this waste we have introduced this scheme.
